
THE BISTRO TRIOMPHE

Which nationality has a racehorse?

In horse racing, the nationality of the winner is determined by the country where it is trained, regardless of where it was born or the nationality of its owners. Since the inauguration of the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, France has won the race 69 times, which puts it into a very strong lead from its main rival Great Britain with 17 victories. Over the last 10 years, it has become a truly international event thanks to 4 victories for France, 4 for Great Britain. I for Ireland and 1 for Germany.

How much can you earn in the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe ?

The Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe has not only been rated the world's best horse race on 5 occasions, it is also the race with the highest prize-money in the French racing calendar. A record 5M€ can be won in the race. Prizemoney is distributed among the first five finishers.

Distributed among the first five finishers:

2nd 1143 000 €

3rd 571 500 €

4th 285 500 €

5th 143 000 €

In each case, prize-money for the first five finishers is distributed as follows:

HISTORY - Birth of the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe

The inaugural running of the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe took place on 3 October 1920 at Longchamp racecourse. At the end of the First World War, the «Société d'Encouragement to improve the Breed of Racehorses», which was to become France Galop, decided to create a highly prestigious race that would showcase the English Thoroughbred in France and would carry significant prize-money. It chose a poignant name for the event: The Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe...

Its name commemorates soldiers who celebrated the end of the First World War by parading under the Parisian landmark that had become a symbol of the Allied victory.

From the start, the ambition was for the race to become one of the most important events in the world of horse racing. And so the legend of the Arc was underway! This year marks the 103rd renewal of this legendary race.

DESTINY OF THE 2023 QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE WINNER



ACE IMPACT, FROM THE RACECOURSE TO A LIFE AT STUD IN NORMANDY



Ace Impact, a fabulous English Thoroughbred, enjoyed an outstanding 2023 season. He completed a rare double when he landed the Qatar Prix du Jockey Club in June at Chantilly and then the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe in October at ParisLongchamp.

Trained in Deauville by Jean-Claude Rouget, one of the greatest French trainers, and ridden by jockey Cristian Demuro, Ace Impact remained unbeaten throughout his career, which saw him go to the post six times!



Following his outstanding victory in a very competitive international field, Ace Impact had nothing left to prove. Rated the best horse in Europe according to the Longines World's Best Racehorse Rankings, he was also crowned «Cartier Horse of the Year» and «Cartier Champion Three-Year-Old» at the 33rd renewal of the Cartier Racing Awards.

Hence, following his victory in the Arc, his owners, the Chehboub family and Serge Stempniak, decided to retire him to stud in order to pursue life as a stallion. His outstanding record is the best advertisement for his future career in this role.

Today, the champion stands at the Chehboub family's Haras de Beaumont, in Normandy. One day, his descendants might follow in his hoof steps and also become Arc winners. This is what the Chehboub family, who own him and breed from him, dream about.

THE MYTHICAL BLOODLINES OF CHAMPIONS

Horse racing at the highest level – embracing races like the Prix de Diane Longines, the Qatar Prix du Jockey Club, and other Group 1 races (the highest level in racing) – are a showcase for excellence. These races govern the selection of the best horses destined for breeding in order to continue the English Thoroughbred's improvement by crossing the most successful bloodlines.

The history of the Arc is marked by bloodlines of champions. One of the most influential bloodline is that of the 1993 Arc winner, Urban Sea. She is the dam of champion Sea The Stars, winner of the Arc in 2009, and Galileo, who was one of the world's most important sires until his death in 2021. Galileo is the sire of Found, winner of the Arc in 2016. He is also the grandsire of dual Arc winner Enable, who won the race in 2017 and 2018!





THE BEST INTERNATIONAL JOCKEYS AT THE START OF THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE





CRISTIAN DEMURO: THE REIGNING CHAMPION! Winner of the Arc in 2020 and 2023

As the winner of the 2023 Arc, he deserves to be top of the list! He might have started his career in Italy, where he was born, but it is in France, where he is now based, that Cristian Demuro has posted most of his most important victories. This fine tactician has lifted two of the past four renewals of the Arc and has no intention of stopping! He shares his passion for horses with his brother Mirco, also a jockey, who is based in Japan.

CHRISTOPHE SOUMILLON: THE MOST EXPERIENCED Winner of the Arc in 2003 and 2008

Belgian-born Christophe Soumillon is one of the most decorated jockeys based in France. He has won nearly 4 000 races, including 73 Group 1 races, the highest level in horse racing, and has won the Arc on two occasions. When he isn't riding, he dedicates his time to the next generation of jockeys by teaching them how to ride in pony races.





MAXIME GUYON: THE CHAMPION FLAT JOCKEY

Maxime Guyon is an incredibly consistent jockey who has been among the top ten jockeys in France since 2009. He has been crowned French Champion Flat jockey three times, and has also been runner-up eight times and finished third four times. With more than 2 900 winners to his name, including about 30 Group 1 races, Guyon has become a firm fixture within the French racing scene. The prestigious Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, however, is still missing from his record.

ALEXIS POUCHIN: THE UP-AND-COMING JOCKEY

Born in Chantilly, which is known as the city of the horse, this young 24-year-old is rapidly establishing himself as a champion-elect. He was the revelation of the 2023 season and confirmed his great talent in major races in 2024. To win the Arc this early in his career would be a dream come true.





MICKAEL BARZALONA: THE SILENT STRENGTH

He is one of the top jockeys with about 1 600 victories to his name since he started his career in 2008. In 2012 he caught the attention of Godolphin, the biggest stable in the world (with its main training hubs in Newmarket and Dubai), who employed him as their number one jockey in France. He was crowned French Champion Flat jockey in 2021 after riding 192 winners that season.



THE BEST INTERNATIONAL JOCKEYS AT THE START OF THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE







RYAN MOORE: THE WORLD'S BEST JOCKEY IN 2023 Winner of the Arc in 2010 and 2016

Born into a racing family, Ryan Moore is the retained jockey of the Coolmore breeding empire that is behind Ballydoyle and trainer Aidan O'Brien in Ireland. Ryan Moore was officially crowned the Longines World's Best Jockey in 2023. He has already received this accolade four times in his career. He has won the Arc twice.

TOM MARQUAND: THE SHOOTING STAR

Tom Marquand has been quick off the mark. He started his career in 2014 and was crowned champion apprentice in England in 2015. Since then, he has won some of the biggest races around the world and is a regular visitor to France. He is married to Hollie Doyle, the most successful female jockey in England. Having become a fixture among the top ten riders in Britain, Doyle was the first woman to win a classic race when she lifted the Prix de Diane Longines aboard Nashwa in 2022.





WILLIAM BUICK: UNCONTESTED CHAMPION

Born in Norway to a Scottish father who was an eight-time champion jockey in Norway, William Buick made headlines from an early age. He won the champion apprentice title twice in England, where he started and continues to pursue his career to this day. He then emulated his father's success when he was crowned Champion jockey in England in both 2022 and 2023. He is the retained jockey in the UK for Godolphin, the Dubai powerhouse.

FRANKIE DETTORI: THE RECORD MAN Winner of the Arc in 1995, 2001, 2002, 2015, 2017 and 2018

The Italian jockey enjoyed an exceptional career in the UK where he is commemorated by a bronze statue at the prestigious Ascot racecourse. He is also the most successful jockey in the Arc, thanks to six victories. Having won nearly every major race on the planet, he retired from racing in England to pursue his career in the US. He is currently based in California.











YUTAKA TAKE: A LIVING RACING LEGEND

Yutaka Take is a star in his home land. The 18-times Champion jockey in Japan has won every major race in his country and other notable races around the world. He is without doubt the reason for Japan's ongoing fascination with the Arc. «I started talking about the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe in Japan more than twenty years ago," he explains. "I rode in my first Arc in 1994. Since then, all I have ever wanted was to win the Arc.» Today, it is the entire country of Japan that wants to win the Arc!

RYUSEI SAKAI: READY TO CONQUER EUROPE AT THE ARC

At 27, Ryusei Sakai, the son of a former jockey, has established himself as one of the rising stars of Japanese horse racing. Currently ranked 4th among the top jockeys in Japan, his career, which began in 2017, already boasts nearly 500 victories, including 28 in Group races. This impressive record has earned him the opportunity to ride Shin Emperor, a Japanese horse brought to Europe specifically to compete in the Arc.





WHY THE JAPANESE DREAM ABOUT THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE

The Japanese are massive fans of horse racing. They wager more than 25 billion Euros each year, which makes Japan the world leader in terms of betting revenues. They yearn for nothing more than a first victory in the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe. Every year Japanese punters wager more than 25 M€ on the Arc alone!

The first Japanese-trained runner in the Arc was Symboli Speed in 1969. Since the late 1990s, nearly every year, Japan has sent over their best horses to run in the Arc. However, following some twenty attempts, the race has so far eluded them.

Japanese horses often arrive in France several weeks before the race in order to acclimatise. They travel over with their work rider and one of the trainer's assistants.

Apart from staff, the horse also travels over with its own feed. In fact, at this level of competition, changing the horse's diet would be inadvisable. Hence, up to 600 kilos of hay and oats can be sent over for just one horse!

THE PREPARATION OF CHAMPIONS: BEHIND THE SCENES

Chantilly, Deauville and Maisons-Laffitte: Three training centres

Racehorses are exercised every day. They are looked after by different trainers and are ridden by specialised riders who follow a strict training programme. The aim is to bring the horse to the top of its form, physically and mentally, for the day of the race. On raceday the jockey will receive riding instructions from the trainer and then it is up to him or her to guide the horse to victory.

France Galop manages three training centres at Chantilly, Deauville and Maisons-Laffitte. These historic sites are dedicated exclusively to the training of racehorses and each training centre is home to horses that will go to the start of the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe.





The biggest training centre in Europe

France Galop manages the Chantilly training centre, which is a historic site dating back to the 19th century. Dedicated exclusively to racehorses, Chantilly is the biggest training centre in Europe. Stretching out over 2 000 hectares in the heart of the Chantilly forest, it is home to some 2 500 horses throughout the year.

There are 120 kilometres of training tracks at Chantilly, which horses use in the early morning hours. They are trained by about 110 trainers that include some of the most famous names in France. Flat and Jump racing professionals can train their horses on 120 hectares of sand tracks, such as the Piste des Lions, in addition to grass tracks like the Plaine des Aigles.

Japanese horses arriving in France a few weeks before the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe finalise their preparations at this exceptional training centre.





Part of the seaside resort

This training centre, which was opened in 1983, sits in the centre of Deauville racecourse. There is a choice of different surfaces for training horses, from sand to grass and even an all-weather track that can be used when frost sets in on the other training surfaces.

More than 400 horses are trained at Deauville by 16 trainers, including Jean-Claude Rouget, one of France's most decorated trainers, who is known around the world. Rouget has have won the world's most important events, including the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe twice, with Sottsass in 2020 and Ace Impact in 2023.



A fabulous training centre for Jump... and Flat racing

The Maisons-Laffitte training centre is renowned for producing Jumps horses. However, it is also an excellent training centre for Flat horses. Trainer Yann Lerner, together with his father Carlos, became the training centre's most important ambassadors when they lifted the prestigious Qatar Prix du Jockey Club at Chantilly in June with Look de Vega. The three-year-old's next target is the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, where he is expected to be partnered by Ronan Thomas.

Since it was restructured in 2019, the Maisons-Laffitte training centre is set in more than 55 hectares with an increased number of horses in training. About 540 horses call it home and a number of new trainers are keen to base themselves at Maisons-Laffitte, which will likely boost the reputation of this exceptional training centre.





FIND OUT MORE ABOUT FRANCE GALOP

France Galop is an association with a public service mission. It organises and regulates horse racing in France with the aim of improving the racehorse breed (both Flat and Jumping) by promoting the breeding industry and training of racehorses. It operates under the authority of the Ministry of Agriculture, Budget and Interior.

Its main mission is to: organise French racing's fixture list, ensure the smooth running of racing, lead the fight against doping, run the operations of the five most important racecourses (Auteuil, Chantilly, Deauville, ParisLongchamp and Saint-Cloud), and organise major events at these venues.

WHAT'S ON THE PROGRAMME

Four days of fantastic racing leading up to the Arc



Four days of racing culminate in the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe. The Qatar Arc Trials, which are run three weeks before the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, provide a final opportunity to evaluate the prospects of horses with designs on the ultimate prize. The show then moves on to Friday, 4 October at Saint-Cloud racecourse, followed by the Arc Weekend at ParisLongchamp racecourse on Saturday, 5 October, and the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe on Sunday, 6 October.

D-21 SUNDAY SEPTEMBER

QATAR ARC TRIALS, the road that leads to the most important race in the world

PARISLONGCHAMP

Three major races take place on Sunday, 15 September 2024 at ParisLongchamp racecourse, which are known as the Qatar Arc Trials. These races, run three weeks before the prestigious Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, give connections of potential runners the chance to fine-tune their horses. It is a great opportunity to see some of the world's best horses, ridden by the world's best jockeys, complete their final preparations ahead of the main event.

On that day of high-level sporting competition, families and friends can also enjoy many free attractions, since it falls under the «Family Day Out Events» banner.

This day at Saint-Cloud racecourse is the prelude to the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe weekend thanks to a card that carries two Group 1 races for Purebred Arabians and one Group 3 race for English Thoroughbreds.

FRIDAY

QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE WEEKEND

SATURDAY OCTOBER

DAY 1 OF THE ARC WEEKEND

PARISLONGCHAMP

The first day at ParisLongchamp racecourse is already packed with highlights, thanks to two Group 1 races and 3 Group 2 races, as well as one Group 1 race for Purebred Arabians. The main event is the Group 1 QATAR PRIX DU CADRAN. It is one of the few races in the racing calendar that is run over 4 000 metres, the longest distance for a Flat race in France. A true marathon, it nevertheless frequently throws up very tight finishes.

DAY 2 OF THE ARC WEEKEND Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe PARISLONGCHAMP

The most anticipated races of the season feature on the card on Sunday, including an incredible concentration of six Group 1 events for English Thoroughbreds, with the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe as the undisputed highlight. There is also the Qatar Arabian World Cup, a Group 1 race for Purebred Arabians.



Qatar Arabian World Cup, the "Arc" for Purebred Arabians

France has a long - and unbroken - tradition of breeding Purebred Arabians, especially for racing. In 2008, the Qatar Racing and Equestrian Club (QREC) and France Galop decided to work together to find the best way of keeping alive this unwavering link that for many decades has united the two countries. And that's when a completely innovative idea was born: to take the magic recipe of the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe - an international world championship for three-year-old and older horses, run over a distance that demands stamina and speed - and adapt it to Purebred Arabians. And so the Qatar Arabian World Cup was born!

From the very first year, the new race was a huge success. It benefited from the limelight cast by the prestigious Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, which takes place on the same day at ParisLongchamp and which gave it a new aura, attracting the world's leading Purebred Arabian owners from the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, France, Oman, the United States, the Netherlands, the Czech Republic, Poland, Russia, Turkey, Tunisia, England, Iraq, Switzerland, Morocco, Bulgaria, etc. Its prize money (currently €1 million) is the highest for a Purebred Arabian race in the Western hemisphere.

In response to the enthusiasm generated by the Qatar Arabian World Cup and to build on it, the QREC and France Galop also created three other major races, all Group 1 PA races (the highest level in the competition) that take place over the same Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe weekend: the Qatar Arabian Trophy for colts, the Qatar Arabian Trophy for fillies (Friday at Saint-Cloud) and the Qatar Arabian Trophy for mares (Saturday at ParisLongchamp). Hence, over the course of three major race days on Arc weekend, the Purebred Arabian breed will be showcasing the very best it has to offer from around the world.

Finally, as the icing on the cake of the Purebred Arabian program, the QREC invented the Triple Crown for Purebred Arabians. To be crowned a Triple Crown winner, the same horse must lift the three major events in the challenge, which takes place in three different countries, at three different times of the year and over three different distances! It doesn't get any more challenging than that! The first leg of the Triple Crown takes place in July at Goodwood (England) with the Qatar International Stakes over 1,600 metres; it continues at ParisLongchamp in October with the Qatar Arabian World Cup over 2,000 metres; and finishes in Doha (Qatar) in February of the following year with the HH The Amir Sword over 2,400 metres.



This last event is not only the grand finale of the Triple Crown... it is also the jewel in the crown of the most prestigious race meeting of the year in Qatar: three major race days in February where horses can earn more than US\$10 Million in prize money.

In France, four horse breeds have their very own racing program: the English Thoroughbred, the Purebred Arabian, the Anglo-Arabian and the AQPS (also known as the French Chaser or Other Than Thoroughbred, which is mainly used in jump racing).






QREC, THE OFFICIAL PARTNER OF THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE

The QREC was established in the early 1960s before achieving official recognition in 1975. It is mandated with representing, promoting and advancing equine and equestrian initiatives, from grassroots programmes to the international arena. Focused on equestrian sport and horse welfare, the QREC is dedicated to promoting Qatar as a world class hub for horse racing and a leader in the Pure Arabian breed.

The QREC works in collaboration with local bodies dedicated to achieving excellence in planning, regulation and the development of Qatar's racing industry to reflect the world's best practices. The QREC has been partner of the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe since 2008, and from 2022, it also became the title partner of the Qatar Prix du Jockey Club, one of the most important races for the selection of the breed.

PARISLONGCHAMP,

A JEWEL DESIGNED TO WELCOME THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE



ParisLongchamp racecourse is renowned throughout the world for its level of difficulty. The tracks are very technical and unique in their design, as they rise and drop before rising again. Throughout the season, these famous tracks host some of the most prestigious races in the calendar. Only the best horses and the most talented jockeys are able to add their names into the record books.

Since its last refurbishment in 2018, ParisLongchamp, as it has since been known, provides an exceptional setting for the most important event of the year. The new grandstand, 160 metres in length, is a modern and audacious architectural marvel. It was designed by well-known architect Dominique Perrault, who was inspired by the movement of a galloping horse. The bold colour of the stand reflects the warm tones of autumnal leaves that fall in the Bois de Boulogne in the autumn, when the Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe is run.

ParisLongchamp is a fabulous sporting and events arena that is also open on days when there is no racing.

THE COURSE OF THE QATAR PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE: THE MOST CHALLENGING 2,400 METRES IN THE WORLD

The 2,400-metre course at ParisLongchamp is very technical by nature! When horses leave the stalls they will accelerate over the first 400 metres to gain a position before meeting their first challenge: a 600-metre rise before the first bend. It is important that horses relax here while remaining within the field.

Then the track begins a long descent where horses are tempted to accelerate, and where jockeys have to pace themselves – this is only the halfway point of the race.

Then comes the long «false» straight, where jockeys manoeuvre for the best possible position from which to launch their attack as they negotiate the final bend. The run for victory commences in earnest once they reach the open stretch (which widens out across the track). In the home straight, which is more than 500 metres in length, horses and jockeys engage in a fierce battle for victory until they reach the winning post.












